1. FINANCE AND ACCOUNTING OPERATIONS

The total flow from the Plant decreased from 2,434 million gallons in April, 2014, to 2,192 million gallons in April, 2015, by 242 million gallons. This equals a decrease of 8 million gallons per day. At the wholesale rate of \$2,389.12 per million gallons, this is equivalent to \$578,167 in revenues for the month.

The total flow from the Plant for the prior reporting period of March, 2015, was 2,324 million gallons. April, 2015, has seen a decrease of 4.4 million gallons per day which is equivalent to \$315,364 in revenues for the month.

2. CUSTOMER SERVICE/DISTRIBUTION OPERATIONS

- Total Customer Service calls for April, 2015, were 11,812; the call-rate abandonment for April, 2015, was eight percent for a total of 691 abandoned calls.
- Total Customer Service calls for March, 2015, were 10,768; total call-rate abandonment was five percent for a total of 375 abandoned calls.
- Year-to-date Customer Service calls for 2014 were 119,442; the call-rate abandonment for the year 2014 was five percent (4,744 calls).
- Year-to-date Customer Service calls for 2015 are 42,178; the call-rate abandonment year-to-date for year 2015 is 1,470.

Customer Information System

• Training is ongoing.

Distribution Operations

- Total work orders for 2014 were 15,033. Year-to-date work orders for 2015 are 4,780.
- For the month of April, 2015, there were 1,847 work orders and 80 radio reads were installed on large, monthly commercial accounts.
- For the month of March, 2015, there were 1,195 work orders and 47 radio reads were installed on large, monthly commercial accounts.
- There were 17 main breaks in March, 2015, and 16 main breaks in March, 2014.
- There were 21 main breaks in April, 2015, and 21 main breaks in April, 2014
- Year-to-date total main breaks for 2015 are 138.
- A total of 175 main breaks occurred in 2014; 165 main breaks occurred during 2013.
- Fifty Employees worked 1,275 overtime hours in April, 2015.
- Fifty Employees worked 1,267 overtime hours in March, 2015.

3. ENGINEERING DEPARTMENT

Current Projects

 Passaic Valley Water Commission is finalizing the scope of work associated with necessary interim structural repairs to the existing thickener tanks at the Little Falls Water Treatment Plant. A memorandum requesting permission to advertise and issue a Request for Proposals (RFP) for design and construction administration services for improvements to the residuals storage and handling facilities will be submitted to the Commission for consideration shortly.

- The public bid contract for furnishing and delivering water meters and for providing a turnkey fixed base radio meter reading system for a selected portion of Passaic Valley Water Commission's distribution system will be advertised in June, 2015. The fixed base system will be furnished, installed and placed in successful service by the Contractor as one of the first items to be completed under the contract. Passaic Valley Water Commission's in-house Personnel will then order and install the meters. Experience gained from that contract will be utilized to guide Passaic Valley Water Commission in finalizing the approach for Passaic Valley Water Commission's long-term water meter replacement and fixed base radio meter reading program throughout Passaic Valley Water Commission's distribution system.
- As part of Passaic Valley Water Commission's long-term initiative to increase replacement of existing failing piping, while continuing the current cleaning and lining program, several pipe replacement projects have been identified and are currently in the planning and design phase. Following completion of design, it is anticipated that both of these projects will be advertised for bids in summer of 2015. Two additional pipe replacement projects have been added, with design and subsequent bidding to follow shortly after release of the first two projects.
- The main interconnecting valve to replace the existing broken valve in the Main Pumping Station has been procured by Passaic Valley Water Commission and installation has been rescheduled to take place in the fall when system demands permit.
- The construction contract for the seismic retrofit of New Street Reservoir Dam is continuing and is on schedule and within budget.
- Passaic Valley Water Commission's project representatives continue to coordinate responses to Requests for Information (RFI's) from the Vendor while the remote sites Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition (SCADA) project continues to progress forward.
- This cleaning and lining project in Clifton and Paterson is continuing on schedule and within budget, with the construction activity re-commencing as soon as weather conditions permitted.
- Rehabilitation of the Great Falls Pedestrian Bridges: The consultant has completed the bid documents for structural and other necessary repairs to these pedestrian bridges. Following incorporation of Passaic Valley Water Commission's final review comments, this Contract will be advertised for public bidding.
- Rehabilitation of Passaic Valley Water Commission's Hydroelectric Generators:

The Request for Proposals (RFP)'s for professional services to assist Passaic Valley Water Commission with the design (including feasibility study and design, preparation of bid documents and services during construction) for rehabilitation of Passaic Valley Water

Commission's hydroelectric generators and related facilities, is being finalized by the Engineering Department.

Following incorporation of several modifications to the conceptual approach, this RFP will be advertised under the Fair and Open Process. This rehabilitation project will consist of two separate bid contracts, the first to rehabilitate the penstock and penstock bypass valves and isolation stop-logs, and the second to sequentially rehabilitate the hydroelectric generators. An initial feasibility analyses will be conducted to determine the number of hydroelectric generator units that should be included for rehabilitation. Following award of the contracts, the rehabilitation phases of the project are anticipated to take place in stages over at least a two-year period with each of the contracts staggered, but anticipated to be implemented concurrently.

- Horizontal Split-Case Pump Rehabilitation Contract: Bid documents will be prepared to
 replace the existing valves that will be needed to individually isolate those pumps for the
 future pump rehabilitation project. This valve rehabilitation contract is anticipated to be
 advertised for bids in year 2015. Sequential rehabilitation of the pumps will take place under
 a separate publically bid contract following completion of the valve rehabilitation contract.
- The Contract for construction of the new Verona Water Storage Tank No. 2 has been awarded and this contract is continuing. Passaic Valley Water Commission's in-house design of the rehabilitation of the existing adjacent Verona Water Storage Tank No. 1 has commenced and the rehabilitation Contract will be issued for bids with the timing coordinated so the existing tank can be taken out of service as soon as the new tank has been completed and placed in service.
- Grant/Loan/NJEIT Funding: Passaic Valley Water Commission's Engineering Department continues coordination with New Jersey Environmental Infrastructure Trust regarding upcoming projects, and future loan-forgiveness opportunities.
- Departmental Support: Assisted other Passaic Valley Water Commission Departments (Purification, Distribution, Maintenance and Legal) on Engineering-related matters such as wholesale billing, allocation-related issues, interconnecting testing, regulatory interfacing related to the dams, the DPCC program, and other regulatory-related issues.

Long-Term Ongoing Projects

Levine Water Storage Improvements Project

Passaic Valley Water Commission is currently reviewing and evaluating proposals received April 27, 2015 for professional services to assist Passaic Valley Water Commission with public outreach and workshop activities for the Levine Water Storage Improvements project.

 Standby Power Generation System at the Plant, Levine, Great Notch and New Street Water Storage Improvements In accordance with discussions with New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection (NJDEP), and as authorized by the Commission, Passaic Valley Water Commission's requested schedule extension from NJDEP to delay the advertising of the generators for approximately 90 days while HUD/Sandy/SRF financing options are pursued has been granted.

Geographical Information Systems (GIS)-Customer Account Validation

The refined customer account database continues being checked by Passaic Valley Water Commission's Engineering and Distribution Departments to verify reconciliation of all account discrepancies.

WATER QUALITY AND TREATMENT OPERATIONS

Little Falls Water Treatment Plant (LFWTP) performance:

- All LFWTP treatment regulatory requirements were met in April, 2015.
- All LFWTP chemical disinfection requirements were met in April, 2015.
- Potassium permanganate was not used for source water treatment in April.
- Primary disinfection with ozone:
 - 1. The required Inactivation Ratios (IR = 1.0) for virus and Giardia disinfection with ozone were met all of the time for all active contactors during April.
- Filtration:
 - There were no regulatory violations in April for either individual filter effluent or combined filter effluent.
 - The maximum CFE turbidity in April was 0.23 NTU. Due to Plant shutdown / startup on April 1.
- Residual disinfection with chlorine:
 - 1. There were no regulatory violations for the chlorine residual concentrations.
 - 2. The target residual in April was 2.0 mg/L (1.8 to 2.0 mg/L). The range during April for CFE chlorine residual was 0.23 to 2.86 mg/L.
 - The CFE chlorine residual varied outside of a range of 1.8 to 2.0 mg/L on the following occasion:
 - April 11, the chlorine residual dropped to a 0.23 mg/L due to Plant Startup.
- Finished water (LFWTP) pH:
 - 1. Finished water pH was usually within the target range of 7.9 to 8.1 and was always between 7.7 and 8.5.

Summary of Outstanding or Compliance Issues by system:

- Main System:
 - Ongoing exceedance of the New Jersey recommended upper limit (RUL) for sodium.
 - Administrative Consent Order with New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection (NJDEP) to address the uncovered drinking water reservoir requirements of the Long Term 2 Enhanced Surface Water Treatment Rule (LT2ESWTR).
- Post Brook:
 - o On-going exceedance of the State Manganese RUL.
- High Crest:
 - New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection (NJDEP) approval granted for use of the Hearthstone Drive sampling station as a regulatory monitoring location for coliforms, and haloacetic acids. The site was already approved for trihalomethanes monitoring.

General Regulatory Compliance Update:

Total Coliform Rule (TCR)/ Revised Total Coliform Rule (RTCR)

- All samples collected in the Passaic Valley Water Commission, High Crest, Lodi, North Arlington, Post Brook and Wallington systems in April were absent for total coliform and absent for E. coli.
- All systems are in compliance with the TCR for the month of April.
- NJDEP approval received for use of the Hearthstone Drive sampling station as a replacement TCR coliform monitoring site for the former State Electric location which no longer accessible for sample collection. The High Crest TCR sample siting plan was updated accordingly.
- NJDEP approval requested and received for the new TCR coliform site which replaces the former site, D83, which is no longer accessible for sample collection.
- Work continues on updating coliform sampling plans. This is an ongoing project.

Consumer Confidence Report (CCR) Rule (Annual Water Quality Report)

 The Post Brook CCR is complete and launched for distribution with the High Crest CCR shortly to follow. Work continues on CCRs for the PVWC main system, Lodi and North Arlington and is expected to be completed shortly.

Lead and Copper Rule

- o All systems are currently in compliance with the Lead and Copper Rule.
- The lead and copper 90th percentile levels from the most recent tap sampling events were below the action levels. The next lead and copper sampling events are scheduled to take place between June-September, 2015.

Long Term 2 Enhanced Surface Water Treatment Rule (LT2ESWTR)

- The second round of source water monitoring for Cryptosporidium, E. coli bacteria and turbidity, began in April. Bi-monthly sampling will continue through April, 2017.
- Results of this monitoring will be used to determine if additional treatment for removal/inactivation of Cryptosporidium is required at the Little Falls Water Treatment Plant.
 Stage 2 Disinfection Byproduct Rule (DBPR)
- All Passaic Valley Water Commission systems are in compliance for total trihalomethane and haloacetic acid levels for the first quarter of 2015. Second quarter compliance monitoring is scheduled to be completed during the first week of May, 2015.

• NJDEP approval requested and received for permanent replacement monitoring sites in the High crest and Passaic Valley Water Commission main systems.

Unregulated Contaminant Monitoring Rule 3 (UCMR3)

- The second of four UMCR3 monitoring events for the Lodi system was completed in February, 2015. The next event is scheduled for May, 2015, and the last monitoring event will take place in August, 2015.
- UCMR3 monitoring requirements are complete for the Passaic Valley Water Commission, North Arlington and Wallington systems.
- UCMR3 monitoring was required for the High Crest and Post Brook water systems.



Laboratory Data Summary


1. Watershed Algae

With the warmer weather and longer days we are seeing a slight increase in the algae growth in the Pompton and Passaic Rivers. The USGS tracking station at Two Bridges captures this increase via the chlorophyll signal they track for us:



The algae detected by these monitors at the present time is, mostly, diatoms. This is confirmed by the USGS chlorophyll signal specific to the diatom population and also by our own laboratory examination of water samples collected at the same location.

The USGS monitor also follows chlorophyll specific to cyanobacteria. The signal we have been seeing so far this year is negligible, as shown below (note that the vertical scaling is 0-2 μ g/L below, compared to 0-40 or 45 μ g/L above):



Cyanobacteria have received increased attention since the Toledo episode last summer so we will be watching this closely again this year.


2. Long-Term-2 Enhanced Surface Water Treatment Rule (LT2ESWTR)
We began our second round of EPA-mandated LT2 sampling in April. We will be sampling twice monthly over a two-year period for Cryptosporidium, Giardia, turbidity and E. coli. The Crypto, Giardia and E. coli testing will be performed by Eurofins lab (formerly Underwriters Laboratory) in Indiana. We will conduct the turbidity analyses ourselves. The results of this study will be used to determine whether PVWC must install additional Crypto removal/inactivation technology at our treatment plant. By internal agreement the sampling will include the Pompton River at Wanaque-South (our location 612A), our headgates (101) and the Passaic River above Two Bridges (110). Presently only the headgates data will be transmitted to NJDEP for compliance purposes since we are only using our Passaic River Intake for treatment.

Crypto/Giardia results for our first sampling, on April 14, 2015, were unfortunately invalidated by the Eurofins lab due to an internal QC issue. Our second sampling took place on April 29, 2015, so we await results.


In the first round of LT2 testing, which sampled locations 612 and 101, the two sources appeared roughly comparable for Crypto occurrence, averaged over the two-year sampling period. If this new round determines that local Crypto occurrence is somewhat higher than before, LFWTP may be allocated into a higher "bin" per the LT2 regulation. That determination would compel us, by Federal regulation, to implement steps towards an additional Log-removal credit for Crypto.

3. MIB/Geosmin Trends – April, 2013, to Present Weekly sampling May – September; Monthly sampling October – April

The MIB level at LFWTP in April returned to normal levels after the one-time peak in March. The March result may have been a spurious data point. A re-sampling one week later at the same location was non-detect (less than 2 ng/L) for MIB.



Geosmin readings in April were measureable but not up to our estimated customer sensitivity level of 7 ng/L at our intake or in our finished LFWTP water. Historically the Geosmin in the Wanaque-N supply turns upward in early spring but we have not seen this occurring so far this year.


The results from the most recent report (their January sampling) are shown below with comparison to the report immediately previous. As confirmation of the GWTT results reported to us, we perform quarterly sampling at our location STRMS-104B, on the Passaic River at the Deepavaal Brook confluence, where we usually detect diminished quantities of some of the analytes reported by GWTT. The most recent results from that sampling are also shown in the table below.

As usual, our monthly sampling at the plant intake location (STRMS-100 on February 12) did not detect any volatile organic compounds, including the ones detected by GWTT at their Deepavaal Brook sampling point.



5. TOC Removal – Intake/RWP, Clarifier Effluent, and Filter Effluent – April, 2014, to date: LFWTP organics removal ratios remained high this month, well above the regulatory minimum of 35 – 45% and approaching the highest %removal levels of the most recent 12-month period. These trends are shown in the figure below, which displays weekly Total Organic Carbon levels in mg/L (left axis) from the Intake through the RW Pumps, the

Clarifier effluent, and a representative Filter effluent. Our overall %Removal of TOC from the Intake water to the Filter Effluent is displayed by the solid line vs. the right-hand axis.



6. LFWTP Plant Dissolved Manganese (non-certified analysis) – previous 13-month period: Last year about this time saw a seasonal increase in dissolved manganese in our intake water and a corresponding slight increase in the dissolved manganese in our Clearwell. This year this seasonal pattern repeated itself and peaked in late March / early April. Our plant was able to ride out this temporary condition and continues to operate without permanganate addition.



- 7. Unregulated Contaminants Monitoring (UCMR-3) Lodi has completed the first two of its four required UCMR3 sampling events. The remaining events will take place in May and August of 2015. That will close out our UCMR3 sampling requirements. The PVWC main system and the North Arlington system have each completed their four quarterly samplings. Following is a summary of our test results to date.
 - O Chlorate. Levels of chlorate observed in the Lodi system to date are roughly in line with levels seen elsewhere in our systems, and so far slightly lower than those seen in Wallington. Results in μg/L are shown in the following table:

o For reference -

- Chlorate was not among the contaminants on which EPA issued a Regulatory Determination in October. However, EPA did state that they will be including chlorate in their overall review of Disinfection Byproducts, expected to be complete by the end of 2015.
- EPA is currently estimating a Health Reference Level (HRL) of 200 μg/L for chlorate.
- Nationwide, based on EPA's published UCMR3 data collected so far (July 2014), about 15% of all water samples collected by then exceeded the 200 µg/L HRL. Nearly 50% of all PWS's engaged in UCMR3 testing for chlorate exceeded this HRL in at least one sampling. As shown above, most of our samples, including Wallington's, exceed the current estimated HRL.
- California has a notification limit (not an MCL) of 800 μg/L.
- The Canadian Guidelines for Drinking Water Quality (updated 2012) give an upper limit of 1000 μg/L.
- WHO drafted an upper limit of 700 μg/L around 2005.
- The lab is setting up one of our IC instruments so we may monitor our own distribution and plant finished water for chlorate as needed after UCMR3 is over.
- Hexavalent Chromium (Cr-6). The Cr-6 found in Lodi's entry-point sample at L40 was among the lowest readings seen to date in our systems during 2013/14. Following is a summary of results observed in our systems and Wallington, plus our NJDWSC supply (results in μg/L):

- Neither hexavalent chromium, nor total chromium, was addressed in the EPA preliminary regulatory determination of October.
- O It does not appear from our data collected in this project that there is significant net formation of Cr-6 occurring within the distribution system itself: the data in North Arlington, Wallington, Lodi and at PVWC-D32 are not significantly higher than the water leaving the LFWTP.
- Effective July 1, California's state MCL for hexavalent chromium is 10 μg/L.
- Θ Because our Total Chromium levels are all below 0.3 µg/L (see Metals, below), our typical Hexavalent Chromium cannot typically be higher than that. This means for routine exploratory monitoring going forward, the simpler and less expensive Total Chromium survey testing will suffice to keep an eye on our maximum potential Hexavalent Chromium levels.
- Hormones. Five of the seven hormones being measured under UCMR3 were "weeded out" of the EPA preliminary Regulatory Determination for lack of current health assessment data. The other two (testosterone and androstenedione) were not mentioned in the Determination.

The LFWTP effluent was measured under UCMR3 for seven hormones. Of these, only one (testosterone) was found at detectable levels in any of the quarterly samplings taken (July 2013, at 0.00097 μ g/L). None was detected in the Wanaque-North supply (<0.0001 μ g/L). Our consecutive systems are not being tested for these hormones under UCMR3.

Metals.

Strontium is the only contaminant identified by EPA in their preliminary Regulatory
Determination as warranting a future Drinking Water Regulation. It will be several years
before the regulatory process resolves itself to the point of an enforceable limit on this
contaminant.

This analyte is commonly found in our water systems, averaging about 95 μ g/L in our UCMR3 samples so far. These results are well below the EPA-estimated child-specific HRL of 1500 μ g/L for Strontium.

- O Vanadium was detected in the July, 2013, sampling at LFWTP (0.3 μg/L) and in North Arlington (0.2 0.3 μg/L). It appeared once more, in July, 2013, at PVWC-D32 (0.25μg/L)These readings are barely above the method reporting limit of 0.2 μg/L. Vanadium has not been detected in the other UCMR3 samplings in any of our systems.
 - Vanadium was "weeded out" of the EPA preliminary Regulatory Determination for lack of updated health effects data and "no to low detections in nationally representative finished water data at levels of public health concern."
 - The EPA estimated HRL for Vanadium is 21 μg/L.
 - California's notification limit for Vanadium is 50 μg/L.
- O Total chromium, although it is already regulated at 100 μg/L, is being measured under UCMR3 for comparison with the unregulated hexavalent chromium data.

Chromium, detected in the November L40 Lodi sample at 0.25 μ g/L, was undetected in the recent February sampling. All readings have been well below the regulatory limit of 100 μ g/L.

- Molybdenum has been undetected (<1 μg/L) in all samples except for the LFTWP sample in October, 2014, which was barely detectable at 1 μg/L.
 - Molybdenum was "weeded out" of the EPA preliminary Regulatory Determination for lack of updated health effects data and "no detections in nationally representative or other finished water data at levels of public health concern."
 - The EPA estimated HRL for Molybdenum is 35 μg/L. Cobalt was likewise undetected (<1 μg/L) in any Lodi sample or other UCMR3 samples to date.</p>
 - Cobalt was "weeded out" of the EPA preliminary Regulatory Determination for lack of updated health effects data and "no detections in nationally representative or other finished water data at levels of public health concern."
 - The EPA estimated HRL for Cobalt is 70 μg/L.
- VOC's undetected to date.


None of the seven VOC contaminants being tested under UCMR3 has been detected in any of the samples collected in our systems.

- 1,4-Dioxane.
 - o In the most recent Lodi sampling, this contaminant was detected at 0.13 μ g/L. It was not detected (<0.07 μ g/L) in the November, 2014, Lodi sampling.
 - The Wallington sampling in November, 2013, also found detectable 1,4-dioxane at 0.13 μg/L.
 - In North Arlington, the October, 2013, sampling found this contaminant in the EPDS sample at 0.16 μg/L.
 - Also in October, 2013, the LFWTP sample contained a small amount (0.14 μg/L) of this contaminant.
 - None of the other samples were found to contain detectable levels of 1,4-dioxane (<0.07 μg/L).

- o This contaminant was "weeded out" of the EPA preliminary Regulatory Determination for "no nationally representative finished water data or sufficient other finished water data."
- \circ The EPA estimated HRL for 1,4-dioxane is 3 μ g/L, well above the observed levels in our systems.
- Perfluorinated surfactants (PFOA, PFOS, etc.) undetected to date.
 - During this round of UCMR, only one sample from any our systems has given a
 detectable reading for any of these compounds: the November Wallington sample, with
 0.022 μg/L PFOA, barely above the reporting limit of 0.02 μg/L. Under the current
 UCMR testing regimen, the minimum reporting limits for each of these compounds range
 from 0.01 to 0.09 μg/L, depending on the specific compound.
 - o For reference -
 - PFOA and PFOS were "weeded out" of the EPA preliminary Regulatory Determination for gaps in both health data and occurrence data. The other perfluorinated compounds included in UCMR3 were not addressed in the EPA announcement.
- The EPA estimated HRL's for PFOS and PFOA are 0.2 and 0.4 μg/L, respectively. EPA has not issued HRL's for the other perfluorinated compounds in the UCMR3 project.
- The NJDEP had developed a health-based drinking water guidance level of 0.04 μg/L for PFOA in 2007.
- Minnesota has established a health-based target maximum of 0.3 µg/L for PFOA and PFOS.
- West Virginia has an Action Level of 0.4 μg/L for PFOA, above which level the PWS would have to provide its customers with alternate sources of drinking water.


8. High Crest THM Removal

This will be the first full summer with complete implementation of corrective actions (spray aeration, recycling, ventilation and pump management) installed over the past couple of years in the High Crest tanks. We are expecting to see THMs remain below the 80 ppb running annual average limit, and possibly even on each individual measurement as well. The Butler influent appears to be increasing in THMs with the warming weather but our tank samples have remained low in THMs. The next Hearthstone sampling will be the compliance sample in early May. There will be no more State Electric samples because the proprietor has requested that we no longer sample at that location.



9. Great Notch Corrosion Control Treatment The following charts display mg/L as PO₄ by our non-certified colorimetric method, averaged for each month for each system shown. This represents the first 4-5 months of corrosion inhibitor injection at the Great Notch facility.


Phosphate levels in both the 330 and the 425 gradients are seen at close to expected levels based on feed rates, essentially regardless of sampling location within a gradient. This indicates that we are getting good dispersion of the inhibitor throughout both gradients. Also shown below are data from two locations in the 300 gradient: our PVWC-D90 location near the Botany pump station, and the PVWC-D28 location on Main Ave. in Clifton (PVWC Offices). Although the Botany injection has been ongoing since December, 2013, we see a noticeable rise in phosphate residual at D90 after the Great Notch injection began in December, 2014, suggesting that inhibitor is flowing from the 330 to the 300 gradient fairly readily. This is also evident by the nearly identical rise in phosphate residual observed at the Main Avenue location.



10. Coliform Profiling

We sample various points monthly for Coliform enumeration, including E. coli enumeration. Raw-water sampling locations include Point View Reservoir and the LFWTP intake. Plant process locations include Clarifier Effluent and Filter Influent. Finished water at the plant (LFWTP and NJDWSC) is sampled as are the surfaces of each Finished Water Reservoir. These monthly studies reveal how bacteria present in raw water are removed through the plant treatment process to the extent that finished water is virtually coliform-free on a consistent basis. However, after this disinfected water is stored in open reservoirs, it regains its bacterial contamination such that it becomes, from a coliform contamination standpoint, nearly indistinguishable from the raw water before treatment. This effect is particularly pronounced in the warm summer months, while in the cold months we can see the bacteria population decreasing. We would expect to see growth return with the upcoming warmer weather.






